**OLD BUSINESS:**

1. **FY 2020 Allocation Packets:** Everyone should have had this information for over a month now. There was not any questions, comments or concerns. The first draft of recommendations will be in the Board packet this month. Finalized recommendations will come in May with the hopes to vote in May on this. We hope to not have a June Meeting.
2. **Retreat Update:** May 4<sup>th</sup> is the Board Retreat at the Wood County Hospital at the Bachman Meeting Room from 8 a.m.- 4 p.m.

**NEW BUSINESS:**

1. **Outcomes Report:** The outcomes report was presented by Chris Streidl. This is a new version, and the committee prefers this version. Please see the attached report.
2. **SOR, ARC, and PDL (State Opiate Response, Addiction Response Collaborative and Project Direct Link):** This is a State Opiate Response (SOR) that is being used to support and expand Addiction Response Collaborative (ARC) and Project Direct Link (PDL). ARC is adding a clinician to the program that responds to people who overdose in Wood County, and ARM is providing a clinician to get Narcan into the hands of people. We increased what we are funding to the ARC program. Currently, we fund an entire position. The expansion of Project Direct Link allows for Lucas County residents and Four County (Williams, Henry, Fulton, and Defiance) residents to come into the Wood County Justice Center or Wood County Correction Center and be placed in Project Direct Link and be served through grant funds. Also, any Wood County residents in Lucas or Four Counties (Henry, Williams Fulton, and Defiance) can be treated with their county funds. This allows us to expand the impact. A resolution will be in the Board Packet. There are a lot of strings attached to SOR funds and restrictions on what it can be used for, and a lot of data collection is required.

OTHER:

**Opiate Conference:** Opiate Conference is coming up on June 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup>. We will be sending this information out.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

**A Renewed Mind-** We just employed our first recovery staff person, who came with 14 years' experience and was the President of NAMI in Alabama. This person would help provide peer recovery support for people who have lived or are living with substance abuse or mental health matters. She will pair with people struggling with substance abuse or mental health and assist them with her lived experience. To become trained a person must go through about 40 hours of online training and 6 or 8 hours face to face training. We can bill Medicaid but are interested in applying additional SOR funding for peer recovery. Sometimes we will get the right person for the job but has not been through the training and needs to travel for training there might be a cost barrier. Some boards have some start-up funds for training. We are fortunate to find someone who is certified for Wood County. Ideally, if the person has lived with either substance abuse or mental health the experience, it's a parallel process with the hopes they could help either or.

**Educational Service Center-** The Junior Teen Institute retreat was last Friday evening, about 50 kids were at Eastwood Middle School with High School students mentoring. It was a success! On April 30<sup>th</sup> we have about 40 students registered for the big state rally in Columbus. At this event, the students will be stressing and stating that most Ohio students are living drug-free lifestyles. The Youth Survey showed 95% of 7<sup>th</sup> - 12<sup>th</sup> graders have not used drugs alcohol or tobacco in the last 30 days.

**Cocoon-** May is Sexual Assault Awareness month. Seventy-five people attended the "What were you wearing" event. The displays of the clothes are Wood County victims clothing of what they wore when the assault took place, or they recreated the outfit. Today the "clothesline project" was at BGSU. This Thursday is our "un-masquerade" event and tickets are still available. Global victims advocate, William Kellibrew IV, will share his experiences as a survivor and help raise awareness of the lifelong impact domestic violence has on children and how one person can make a difference.
