<u>INTRODUCTIONS:</u> Meeting was called to order at 12:03 PM. Laura started the meeting with introductions, allowing those present both in person and virtually, to introduce themselves and state where they are from.

EDUCATION MODELS OF CSU: Laura provided a presentation (attached) to explain the different models for CSU as we travel to see them. Laura highlighted the gaps in our county to review and discuss during our visits. Feedback from LEO's is the desire for a hub, to allow for drop-offs, as we no longer have an "urgent care", such as The Link. One of the models discussed was a 23-hour observation model, which allows for continued evaluation. This model would have a multi-disciplinary team and on-site crisis intervention. Frank asked what a "pink slip" was, and it was explained that this is for involuntary admission to a psychiatric facility. Deanna explained the Living Room and the Adam & Amanda models. Leslie stated that she like the Adam & Amanda model, as this allows for a longer stay for medication, making sure the correct medications have been prescribed. Dan asked if people would be allowed to check-in and check-out, could someone be ordered to the Adam & Amanda model? Laura highlighted the challenging and unique aspects of the CSU model, and that we could potentially choose multiple models, based on what would work best for our county. These are things to think about during our site visits. Some of the sites are hours away and will potentially be day long expeditions. Board Members were asked to email Kathryn if interested in attending the sites. Jessica asked if we could video call for those who cannot attend. Franks asked for a spectrum of possible funding costs, as a 24/7 access to psychiatric teams can be costly. Laura then asked the committee for questions to focus on during the visits. Committee members stated the questions they would like to see answers to.


ADJOURN: Dan Lambert motioned to adjourn, Corey Speweik seconded. Meeting was adjourned at 12:49 p.m.



- · Living Room Model
  - Home like atmosphere
  - Short term
  - Voluntary

- Adam and Amanda
  - Can be in lieu of going to the hospital or as a step-down.
  - Can stay up to 50 days
  - · Longer transition onto medication
  - Access to doctors and other services for recovery

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
